PDG outcomes

This details the impact that our PDG activity had on pupils in the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

Question 1: What changes have had to be made to your PDG plans for this year?	£64,400 -Areas linked to SDP include, reading, maths access to IT (DCF), mental health and wellbeing.
	PDG grant has been used (as planned) to purchase and implement Lexia, this has had an impact on identified pupils. It has also allowed staff to be released to carry out ELSA although some of this was done virtually it has still been invaluable in supporting the mental health of identified children. 20-21-'Top up' of accelerated learning grant to support pupils who have fallen behind due to pandemic. A greater emphasis on Wellbeing due to the lockdowns and restrictions that have been enforced.
Question 2: Has there been any impact on FSM learners? (please focus on teaching and learning, well-being and engagement).	We have been able to establish through monitoring of our online learning that the majority of FSM learners engaged throughout the most recent lockdown, many of them also attended 'hub' and took part in learning in very small groups. We have stayed in close communication with our families, particularly those FSM learners and anecdotally wellbeing is good in the majority of cases-we are about to pilot PERMA in year 3 in order to measure pupil wellbeing.

	MyMaths and Oxford Reading Buddy in addition to the Home Devices given out assisted in nearly all of our FSM pupils engaging in learning through the lockdowns. In the Summer Term priority was given to FSM pupils' wellbeing, concentrating on ELSA and Jigsaw activities.
Question 3: What are your main concerns regarding your FSM learners and how do you plan to address these in 2021-22?	Our concern is continuing that engagement that good attendance continues as the school opens up to all pupils. Lexia and ELSA are ongoing. Accelerated learning is in place and provided by the pupils own class teachers. Oxford Reading Buddy is proving popular with our families and pupils especially our most vulnerable. (Pupil have been given a laptop and/or WIFI for Self isolation/lockdown) In addition to the wellbeing activities, focus will be given to Reading and Mathematics catch up for FSM pupils. A new suite of proven interventions are to be implemented from September 2021. These will be individual to the pupils' needs and carefully monitor their progress. We are assigning a TLR holder to each intervention and a LSO to run each.
